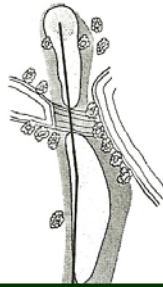




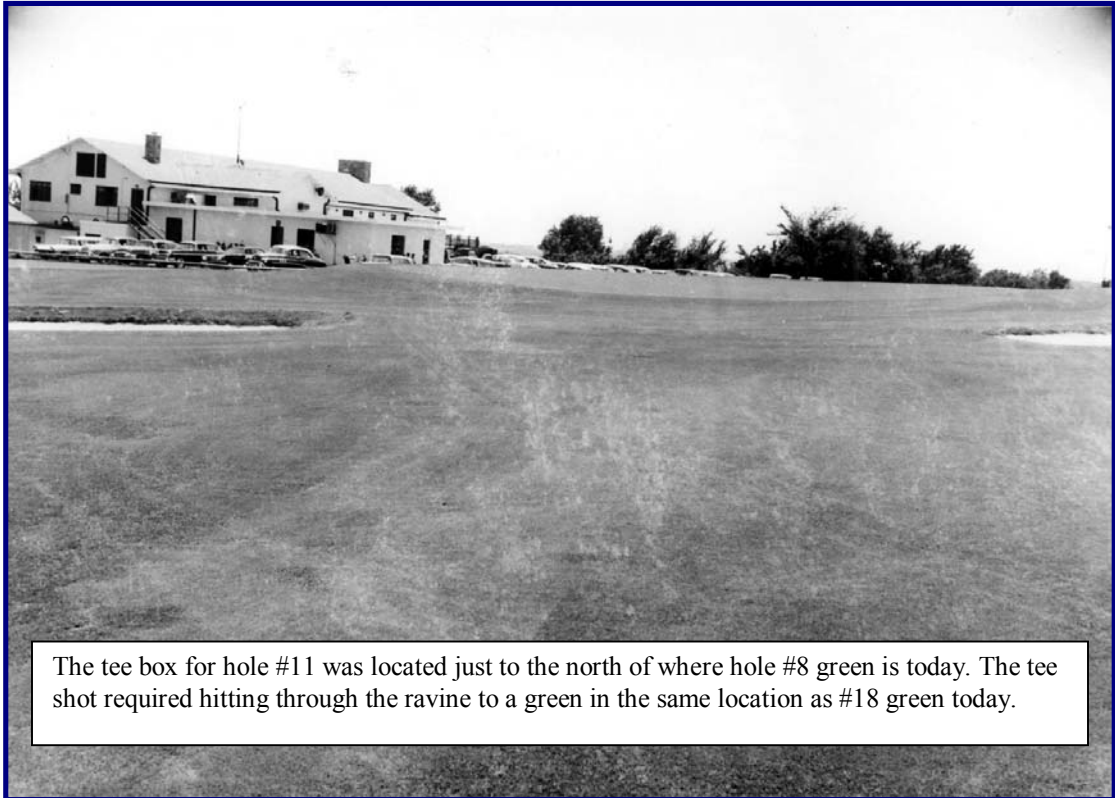
The tee box for hole #10 was just south of the swimming pool and ran to the north and east to about where hole #8 green is located now. J.B. Hron once hit a tee shot that landed on the roof of the old Golf Shop (now the Ladies Locker Room). Gervis McGraw came out and asked J.B. what course he was playing.

Hole No. 10 - Par 4 - 420 yards



The best par four hole on the course, with a big premium on long drives. Tee shot should be played to the left center of the fairway, leaving shortest distance to the green. Canyons on the left and right of fairway 100 yards short of the green could give some trouble. Second shot requires long iron or wood to reach green. Green is large and slopes from right back to left front.

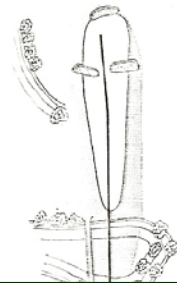




The tee box for hole #11 was located just to the north of where hole #8 green is today. The tee shot required hitting through the ravine to a green in the same location as #18 green today.

Hole No. 11 - Par 4 - 275 yards

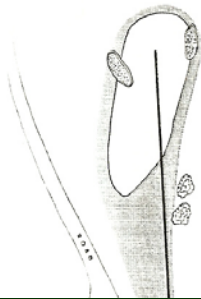
A short, but tricky, par four hole that should play easy for most players. Long hitters might try for the green, but will probably prefer to get home safe with a three wood and a short pitch. There is a canyon 30 yards off the tee, with trees on both sides. Sand traps guard the green left and right 15 yards short, with large trap back of green.





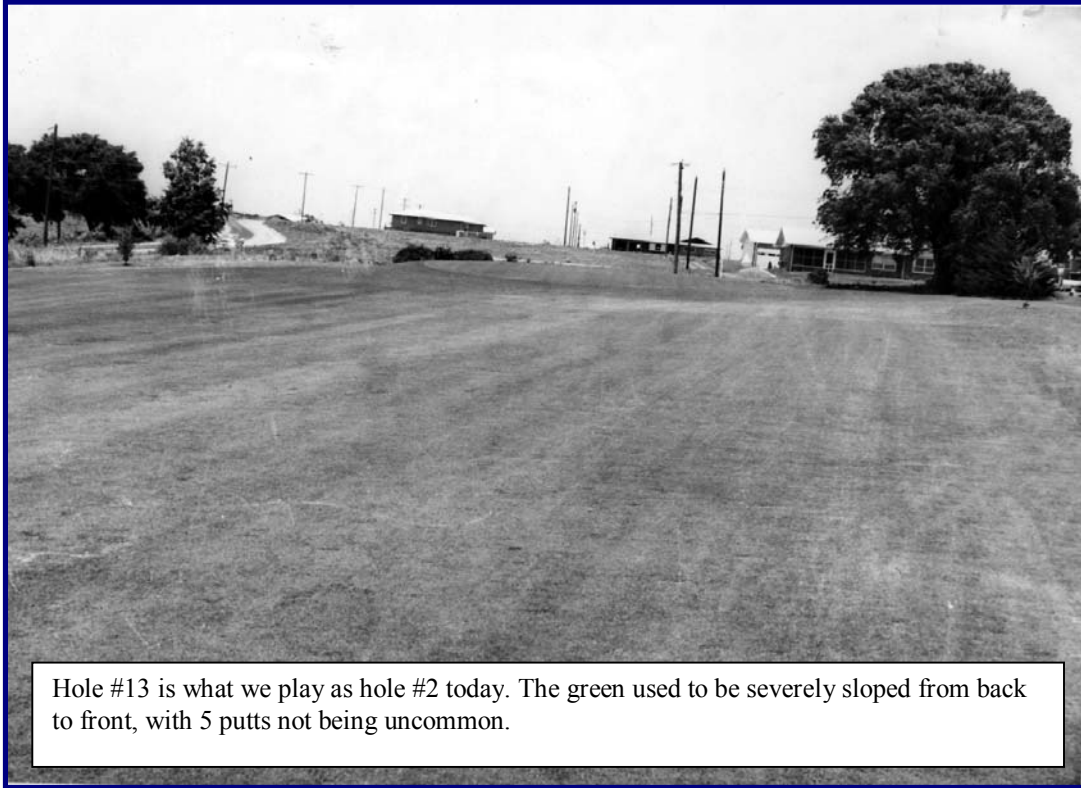
Hole #12 teed off from where the ladies tee box on hole #1 is today to a green located just to the south and east of the current pond on hole #1.

Hole No. 12 - Par 3 - 140 yards



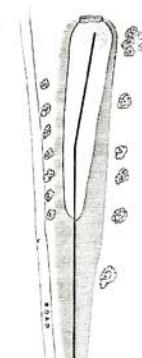
A short par three hole, guarded by traps right and left. The green is very small, which makes it a difficult target. The winds are variable, more often than not from left to right. When they shift behind, or occasionally directly at the tee, the hole can be anything from a six to a nine iron.

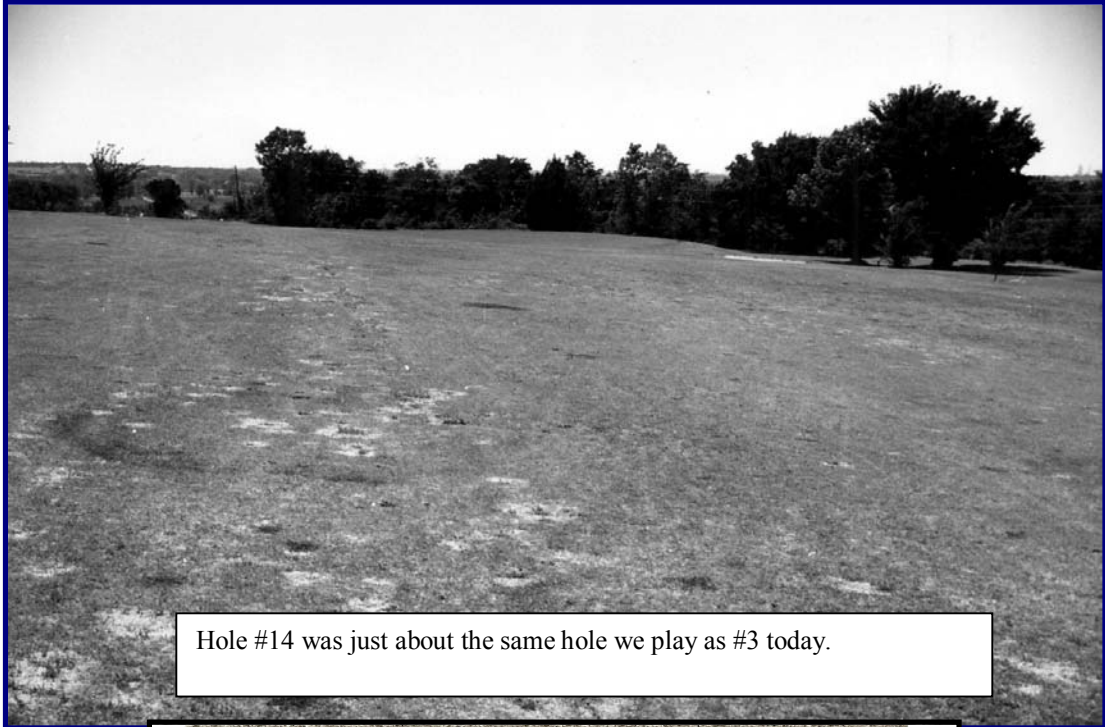




Hole No. 13 - Par 4 - 395 yards

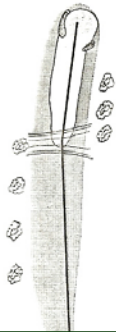
A par four hole that creates lots of tension off the tee. The fairway slopes from right to left with out of bounds lining the left side of fairway. A perfectly placed tee shot will leave an easy short or medium iron to the green. A bold second shot will find the sand trap or out of bounds behind the green. Depending upon pin placement a player must read green surface with extreme care to avoid three-putting.





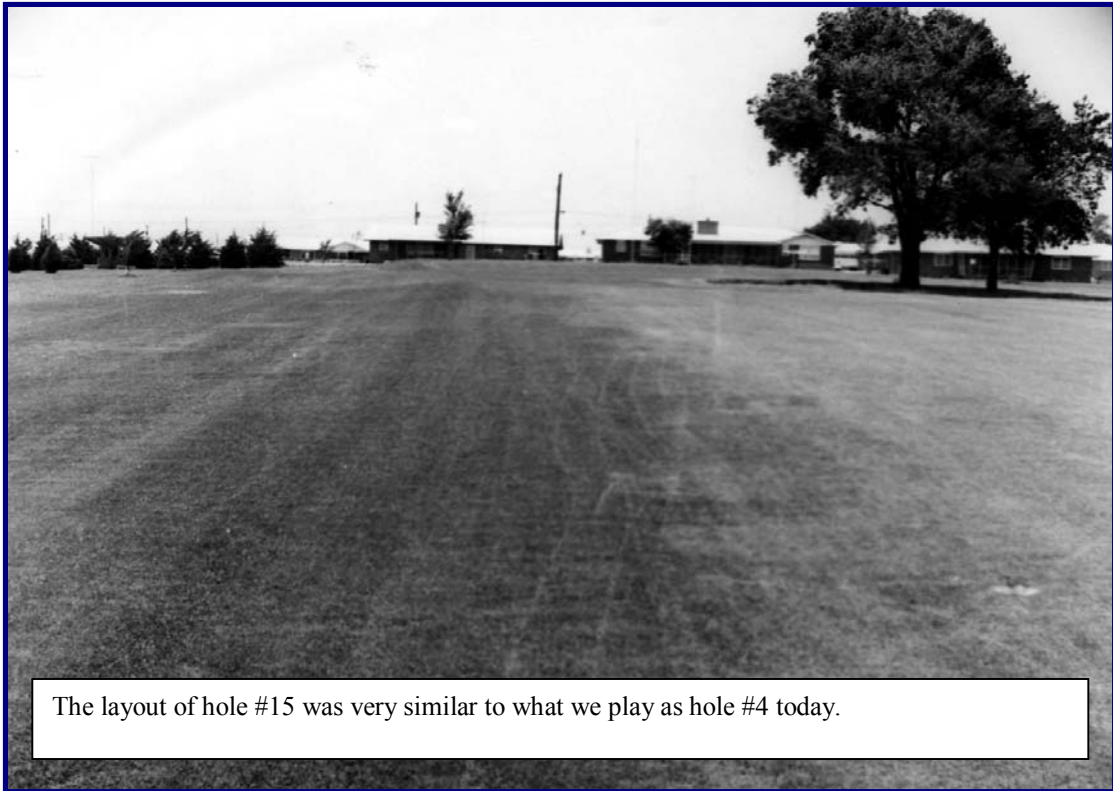
Hole #14 was just about the same hole we play as #3 today.

Hole No. 14 - Par 4 - 375 yards



A short par four that affords no difficulty for most players. The tee shot should be played left, as the fairway slopes to the right. Strayed second shots will find a blind sand trap to the left side of the green and a small trap right front. Green is of average size and slopes moderately from back to front.

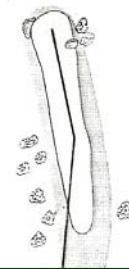


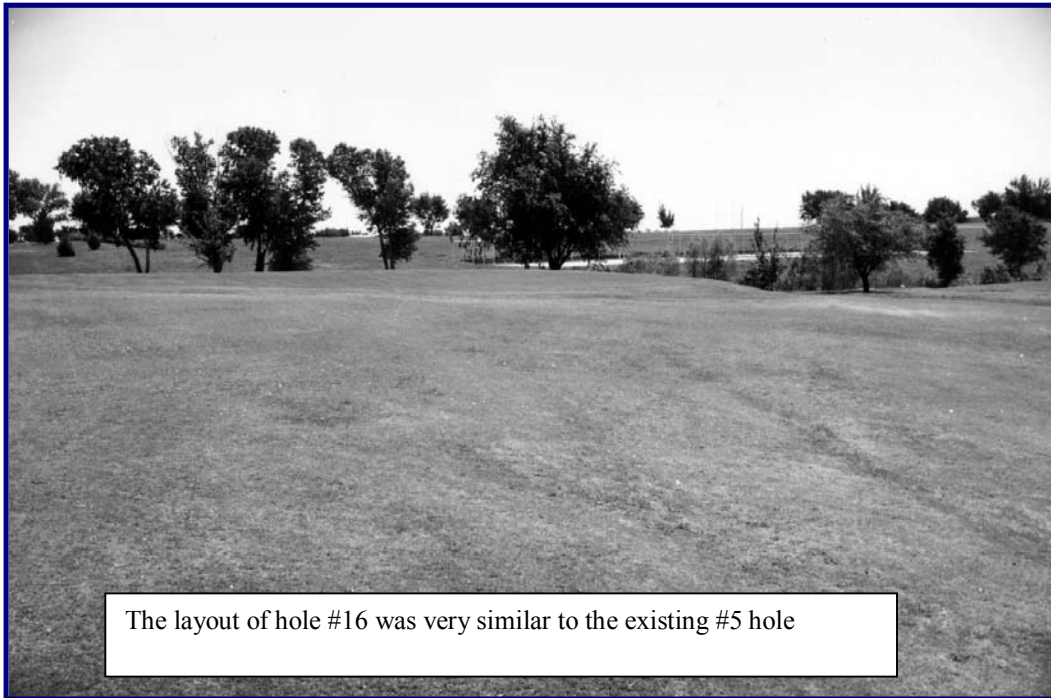


The layout of hole #15 was very similar to what we play as hole #4 today.

Hole No. 15 - Par 4 - 360 yards

A wide open fairway, with a minimum of trouble, gives the long hitters a chance to let out. A slight dogleg to the left makes the best tee ball position at right center. The green is trapped at right front and left side and, depending upon pin placement, can present some tricky putting problems.





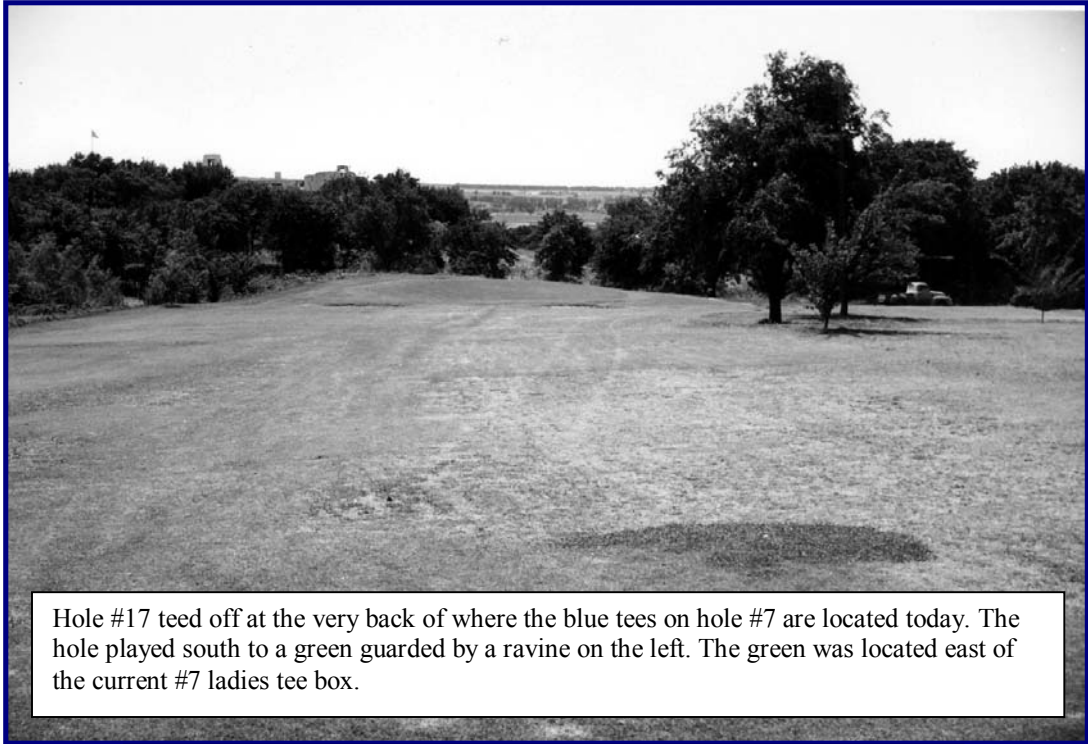
The layout of hole #16 was very similar to the existing #5 hole

Hole No. 16 - Par 5 - 480 yards



The power hitters have an edge here, as a long tee shot offers the opportunity to get home in two shots. The fairway is flanked by out-of-bounds on the left and heavy rough on the right. The cautious player will prefer to place his second shot to the left thus avoiding a tall stand of trees on the right, and leaving short pitch to the green. A sharp slope running through the middle of this large green makes long putts hard to judge.

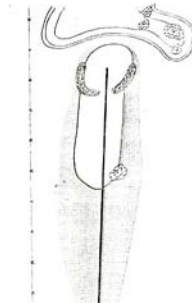


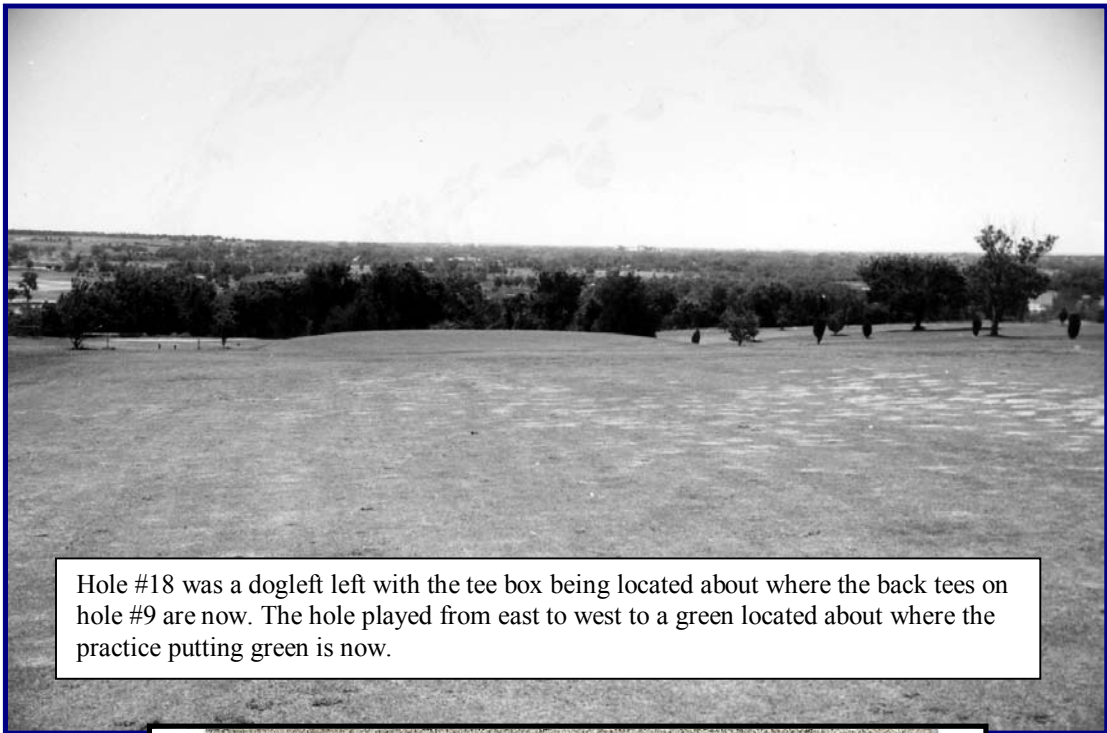


Hole #17 teed off at the very back of where the blue tees on hole #7 are located today. The hole played south to a green guarded by a ravine on the left. The green was located east of the current #7 ladies tee box.

Hole No. 17 - Par 3 - 135 yards

The shortest of the par 3 holes at Ponca City Country Club. Looks easy, but can play hard. Long, shallow sand traps wrap around front portion of green, leaving a small entrance. A pulled tee shot can find heavy rough or out-of-bounds to the left. Mound shaped green is generally fast and slick—can make for mean putting.





Hole #18 was a dogleft left with the tee box being located about where the back tees on hole #9 are now. The hole played from east to west to a green located about where the practice putting green is now.

Hole No. 18 - Par 5 - 555 yards



A good finishing hole with a decided dogleg to the left 300 yards off tee. A small canyon in front of tee with tall trees that hang out on both sides. Best tee shot position is left center of fairway, leaving the shortest route home. Second shot should be played across corner of dogleg, leaving a short iron shot to the green. Green has a depression running through the middle, but, depending upon pin placement, is fairly easy to read.
